What is SCE Evaluation?



Assess and address community effects



Involve affected community



Ensure community values and concerns receive adequate attention



Consider civil rights implications





Why evaluate sociocultural effects?

- Create and maintain harmony between the human and natural environments
- Fulfill social, economic and other requirements of present and future generations
- Provide safe, healthful, productive, and aesthetically and culturally pleasing surroundings
- Preserve important historic, cultural, and natural aspects of our national heritage

National Environmental Policy Act Sec. 101 (42 USC § 4331)





FDOT Sociocultural Effects Evaluation Policy

- Work proactively with communities
- Understand community vision, goals, objectives, and values
- Provide effective, communitybased solutions to transportation needs
- Address appropriate community concerns


- Planning/Programming Screens

SCE in **Project** Phases



Planning Screen Evaluations

Identify fatal flaws or controversies





SCE in Project Phases



Programming Screen Evaluations

- Update review of project effects
- Provide scoping recommendations
- Identify targeted public outreach





SCE in **Project** Phases



PD&E Evaluations

- Build upon previous evaluations
- Focus on issues of concern
- Produce environmental documentation





Community Outreach

Supports the Entire Process



- Provides early identification of community issues and goals
- Builds trust with community
- Allows opportunity for community verification of information
- Invites community feedback
- Assists in identifying non-viable projects
- Minimizes controversy





How do we evaluate sociocultural effects?

Step 1: Review Project Information

Step 2: Define the Study Area

Step 3: Prepare the Community Characteristics Inventory

Step 4: Evaluate Sociocultural Effects

Step 5: Recommend Ways to Resolve Issues



Step 6: Document Findings
